### High School vs. College: What to Expect

High school and college are very different, but don't worry. The easiest way to make a seamless transition from high school to college is to understand these differences beforehand:



- A school day that starts at 11 A.M. and ends at 3 P.M. might sound "easy" but college requires a lot of out-of-class time for studying and homework. Be prepared for this and learn to manage your schedule accordingly.
- In high school, other people structured your time. In college, you are expected to manage your time wisely and accept responsibility for the success or failure that results. If you're out partying instead of studying, you have nobody to blame but yourself, so get used to owning up to your behavior.
- In high school, your teachers usually cover all homework and reading material in class. In college, you have to do the reading even if it isn't covered in class, because you are expected to know it for tests and final papers. If you don't read and understand the material, it will show in your papers and test scores.
- In college, due dates are VERY important. Most professors don't take late work and don't allow you to make up the work (or points) you've missed.
- In college, participation in conversations and lectures is expected. Come prepared with questions and dialogue based on the assigned work.
- You have more freedom to choose your course of study according to what you're passionate about and interested in. This freedom means more responsibility though. Don't waste time taking classes you don't really need because you are spending time and money on them. Work with your adviser to help make sure you sign up for courses that count toward your degree.
- Scholarships and financial aid are generally awarded per semester, so chances are you will need to apply each semester. Check with your financial office to learn the requirements of what you're receiving.
